

Romeo and Juliet - Act I, scene 5 - Palm to Palm

Activity*:

- Divide into groups of two: one reads Juliet, the other reads Romeo.
- 1st read through once together.
- 2nd read through underline the last word of each line that is part of a rhyme.
- 3rd read through stand facing each other with enough space in-between.
 - Each time the line rhymes with another of your lines take 1 step forward [\rightarrow 1].
 - Romeo, each time your line rhymes with Juliet's line, take 2 steps forward $[\rightarrow 2]$
 - Juliet, each time your line rhymes with Romeo's line, take 2 steps forward $[\rightarrow 2]$.

ACT II, Scene 5, at the Capulet's ball (edited excerpt)

Romeo:	[To JULIET] If I profane with my unworthiest <u>hand</u> This holy shrine, the gentle fine is this, My lips, two blushing pilgrims, ready <u>stand</u> [example $R \rightarrow 1$] To smooth that rough touch with a tender <u>kiss</u> . [example $R \rightarrow 1$]
Juliet:	Good pilgrim, you do wrong your hand too much, Which mannerly devotion shows in this, [example $J \rightarrow 2$] For saints have hands that pilgrims' hands do touch, [] And palm to palm is holy palmers' kiss. []
Romeo:	Have not saints lips, and holy palmers too?
Juliet:	Ay, pilgrim, lips that they must use in prayer.
Romeo:	O, then, dear saint, let lips do what hands do; [] They pray, grant thou, lest faith turn to despair. []
Juliet:	Saints do not move, though grant for prayers' sake.
Romeo:	Then move not, while my prayer's effect I take. [] Thus from my lips, by thine, my sin is purged.
Juliet:	Then have my lips the sin that they have took.
Romeo:	Sin from my lips? O trespass sweetly urged! [] Give me my sin again.

Questions:

- 1. Who makes the first move?
- 2. Do you see a pattern in this movement?
- 3. What does this say about the characters and the metaphors they are using?
